Never underestimate the power of an origin story. I recently caught up with a former Huron Pines AmeriCorps member, whose passion and purpose **speaks to our vision for community-driven conservation**, and where we're headed in the 50 years to come.



For Maddie Khuri, it was never just one single thing. She always wanted to know more about the world, and from early on had a deep love for wildlife. Maddie's Huron Pines AmeriCorps service with the U.S. Forest Service in Mio, Michigan was a great fit. After college in Alabama and Peace Corps service in Zambia, Maddie worked to bring communities and people closer to the Kirtland's Warbler and their unique habitat through community education and outreach. This helped to solidify Maddie's passion for community, conservation and teaching.

"The unique service opportunities with Huron Pines AmeriCorps were the key to my being more connected to a place here in Northern Michigan than anywhere else in my life," Khuri reflects on her time and how it has impacted her current work as Huron Pines' Community Education Project Manager. The volunteers Maddie works with through our Community Education programs are making a direct impact on wildlife habitat and quality of life in small communities across our region.

Very few initiatives can impact a region like this effort.

Empowering people to protect nature drives our vision for community-driven conservation.

Once people see themselves as agents of change, they are encouraged to find solutions. Maddie's experience and leadership are bringing people together to experience nature on our preserves, along a river and in their hometowns and backyards.

2. Taking action in coastal communities to ensure the long-term health of Lake Huron, forever.


Working with city and state partners, we're bringing infrastructure improvements that will help increase water quality to many coastal towns and areas, including Rogers City. Along with improving tree canopy coverage for water quality, we're assisting Rogers City with a road project that will result in two new bioretention areas along major thoroughfares to reduce runoff and collect over 150,000 gallons of runoff (full of salt, sediment, oils and fertilizer) that would otherwise pollute nearby Lake Huron.



3. Saving and stewarding land in priority watersheds now.

Help us protect and preserve the character of wild places by volunteering time and resources to this effort. Together, we can expand our restoration impact and make new acquisitions around Northeast Michigan, such as along the AuSable River and connecting wildlife habitat corridors in the Pigeon River Country State Forest.


Our origin story began with the realization that we have to act today, because the future isn't a given.
